October 2, Marin Independent Journal, "Researchers delve into unchartered territory, the life off of Marin's coast" By Mark Prado. "Bobbing in five-foot swells in the dark green waters north of the Farallon Islands about 20 miles south of Point Reyes, researchers drop nets and tubes more than 600 feet into the ocean deep. They are trying to determine what lies below the surface. ... Specifically, researchers are aiming to unravel the distribution and abundance of marine wildlife in the ocean by conducting surveys for sea birds and marine mammals as well as the microscopic building blocks of the aquatic food chain. http://www.marinij.com/marinnews/ci_19007739

October 3, Santa Rosa Press Democrat, "Scientists at work in nature's abundant pantry" by Guy Kovner. "More than 40 miles out from the Golden Gate Bridge and over an undersea slope plunging from the edge of the continental shelf, a team of scientists lowered a specialized net into the cold, green Pacific Ocean. ... Jaime Jahncke, director of marine ecology at Petaluma-based PRBO Conservation Science, already knew the catch would be slim. "Honestly, right now there's not much of it here," Jahncke said last week aboard the Fulmar. Bird Observatory and other agencies, Dransfield took part in a week-long boat survey of marine mammals in the Gulf of the Farallones National Marine Sanctuary this summer. "I'm using GIS to overlay maps of the humpback whale sightings with maps of water temperature, salinity, topography of the ocean floor and primary productivity ..."

October 11, KQED Quest, "Guadalupe Island: Protecting Sharks through Ecotourism" by David McGuire. Today, white shark watching occurs off the Farallon Islands under permit by the Gulf of the Farallones National Marine Sanctuary requiring trained naturalists and using strict best watching practices.

October 12, Half Moon Bay Review, "Pillar Point Harbor considers building coastal office. District shares big plans for Perched Beach." ... Gulf of the Farallones National Marine Sanctuary has for several years proposed a visitors center on the San Mateo County coast. The national organization formed a working group in 2009 to determine the goals of a visitors center and consider a half-dozen locations. Out of those discussions came a concept plan that identifies Pillar Point Harbor as the preferred site. But the marine sanctuary had to close its Half Moon Bay office in May due to severe budget cuts. So far, the Sonoma Coast — considered part of the Greater Gulf of the Farallones — is doing well, owing largely to the coast's sparse population, which minimizes land-based pollution. ..."

"Yesterday I led another expedition out into the Gulf of the Farallones on the Outer Limits with Captain Jimmy. These wildlife tours transit the waters of the Gulf of the Farallones National Marine Sanctuary and visit the southeast Farallon Island, then continue on to the continental shelf where the coastal plane drops into the abyss of the deep sea. Primarily billed as whale watching, these trips are really about the entire ecosystem, ..."

November 2, FIS.com/Fish Information & Services, "Black abalone's critical habitat: NOAA NOAA's Fisheries Service filed with the Federal Register a final rule that identifies black abalone critical (Haliotis cracherodii) habitat along the California coast to include rocky habitats, and the coastal marine waters above the benthos from the mean higher high water (MHHW) line, or average high tide, to a depth of six meters (approximately 20 feet) in the following areas ... From Del Mar Landing Ecological Reserve to Point Bonita, From the southern point at the mouth of San Francisco Bay to Natural Bridges State Beach ...
